Dear Union Friends,

We've had a rich Lenten season at Union! Our ministries have worked together to provide meaningful ways for our members and friends to prepare for Easter.

We made a lasting impact with the "Together We Can Reach Farther" campaign for One Great Hour of Sharing in which our Outreach and Education ministries raised \$2,475 for the UCC's refugee, disaster relief, and development ministries all over the world. We encircled the sanctuary with symbols of our offering, showing our children how far our efforts can reach when we work together.

The Advocacy team led us in a study of Becoming Welcoming Communities, a curriculum developed by the Wisconsin Council of Churches to study both Biblical teachings on welcoming immigrants as well as the rich history of immigration here in Wisconsin. More than 25 people participated over the four-week series.

Our Lenten Cluster this spring took on a new twist. Every Sunday evening in Lent, we came together over soup and popcorn to screen a film and discuss its faith implications. Participants, many of whom have participated in the Lenten Clusters in the past, said that this was a great format for engaging real issues of faith and life.

Thank you to all who made these meaningful opportunities possible.

All of these Lenten offerings have been preparations for Easter, ways to open our minds and hearts to the church's celebration of Jesus' resurrection.

But did you know that Easter is a season, too?

Many of us will come together to worship on Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, and Good Friday, culminating in our joyous Easter celebration. Afterward, some will hunt for eggs, and the Inreach Ministry will serve a delicious breakfast.

For some of us, pondering the spiritual implications that Pilate "washed his hands" of Jesus' fate will hold new meaning given the political landscape of 2017. For others, Peter's abandonment of Jesus when the chips were down will hold particular resonance this year. There are any number of rich reflections and practices that can round out our Lent.

So this year, I encourage you to take on an Easter discipline.

What would it look like to be an agent of the resurrection for the 50 days after Easter, from Easter to Pentecost? Would you write 50 notes of gratitude and kindness and hope to people you know need picking up? Would you make 50 little anonymous gifts to strangers because of the gift of God's gracious love? Does an Easter discipline look like volunteering with Habitat for Humanity, helping families to experience the new life of resurrection? Is your Easter discipline continuing to refrain from negativity for the next 50 days, committing yourself to spreading healing instead of bitterness? Maybe it's taking a walk every day, keeping your eye out for signs of the resurrection and God's grace.

We've had a rich and meaningful Lent. My prayer now is that, with God's grace, our Easter will be even more powerful.

Parent to Parent

How We Integrated our Kids into Worship Time

Bringing one's kids to worship can be a challenge! Worship is primarily geared to adults, and therefore can be mind-numbingly boring for children. On the other hand, if a parent wants his/her child to be a part of the life of the church, letting them skip worship week after week sends a message and deprives the child of being exposed to key traditions. What's a parent to do?

The solution that worked for Tim and me was to structure our kids' worship experience in a way that was appropriate for their developmental stages and particular personalities—and to gradually increase their involvement in worship as they matured. As I recall, this played out as follows:

<u>Infancy</u>: We brought our babies into worship, ready to leave for the nursery should they become too noisy (i.e. inconsolable crying).

<u>Crawling/mobile stage</u>: Our kids—all three—were extremely hyper. I would look with envy at those parents whose 9 month olds and toddlers would sit patiently on their parents' laps. Sigh. My kids would be crawling under the seats after the first five minutes. So ... they got put in the nursery so we could focus on an hour of spiritual recharging!

Older toddler/preschool stage: When they could sit still for 20 to 30 minutes, they came into worship for the first part, during which we had them well supplied with Bible picture books (one useful tradition we stuck to was that any books/entertainment in worship had to be Bible or Christian related). They left after the children's sermon—either for the nursery or for the preschoolers' Sunday School that our church at that time provided. (At Union, the Storyteller time would work well for this).

School age: By kindergarten or first grade, we expected them to stay for the whole service, and to actually start participating, especially after they could read. Of course, we would help by sharing a bulletin and hymnal with them, pointing out the responses and lyrics. At first, we only required this for the first part of the service (usually up to the sermon), after which they could read a children's Bible. As they matured, we gradually required them to participate further into the service, until they were participating the entire time.

We found that this gradual introduction into worship prevented unrealistic expectations on our part that could lead to open rebellion on their part. The key seemed to be to assess each child's tolerance for sitting still, listening, etc., and not asking too much too soon. This worked really well for us. (A bonus was that all of our kids became very familiar with basic Bible stories due to their early routine of reading children's Bibles during the service.)

Parent to Parent Happenings

At the last sharing meeting, the group decided to make the second Sunday of each month our default meeting time. The next opportunity to share with other parents will be Sunday, April 9, at 9 a.m. in the Chapel Classroom.

Madison Action Day

On Thursday, March 30, Pastor Bridget and three of our church members traveled to Madison to join JOSHUA, WISDOM, and statewide interfaith affiliates to stand together as part of a sacred community. More than 800 individuals prayed, learned, and marched together (in the rain) to support policies that affect individuals in our own community and statewide. Issues addressed included: crimeless revocation (re-incarcerating people for rule violations without any new crime being committed); inhumane treatment statewide via solitary confinement; immigration; transit; healthcare; and the "Back 40 mine project" (impact to the Menominee River, the Bay of Green Bay and sacred tribal lands from proposed mining).

Our members met with representatives at the Capitol including Senator Robert Cowles (rightmost in photo above) and Senator Dave Hansen. Please continue to support JOSHUA, learn more at upcoming open forums planned here at Union, and watch our weekly bulletin for more information.


On any day in Wisconsin, at least 900 prisoners are in solitary confinement, enduring 23 or even 24 hours alone, often for weeks or even longer. JOSHUA hopes that by providing a way for people to experience solitary confinement, even for a few moments, we can shine a light on this issue, making it more visible to our citizens.

A Meaningful Getaway

Searching for a meaningful getaway? How about an adult mission trip to Back Bay Mission in Biloxi, Mississippi? Back Bay is a community ministry of the United Church of Christ that meets the needs of those suffering from poverty and its effects while building pathways to social justice.

A group from UCC churches is planning a service trip from November 25 to December 3. Work days are Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday. Participants work in the food pantry, rehab homes, and help in the homeless shelter. Cost is \$175 per person for materials and lodging. Additional costs for hotels en route, gas, and food while at Back Bay Mission depend on final numbers going, the sharing of rooms, and so on.


