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"Calmly Plotting the Resurrection"

There's a book on my shelf entitled "Calmly Plotting the Resurrection." The book itself probably wouldn't be very interesting to laypeople—it's an outline of weekly retreat themes and ideas intended to draw us toward Easter, toward newness in Christ, toward a resurrection way of being.

But that title!

"Calmly Plotting the Resurrection," intentionally moving toward newness of life, intentionally moving toward a spirituality that embraces the central Christian notion that the death dealing powers of this world are no match for the power of God, now that is something I hope is compelling.

This idea of calmly plotting how to live the deepest Christian truth, that God is stronger than the grave, that God will not leave the powers of destruction to have the last word, comes to mind as I share with you the Generosity Team's invitation to participate in our Easter Offering. A new offering opportunity, the Easter Offering, is an invitation to make a one-time gift to the operating expenses of the congregation, in the spirit of resurrection and renewal and vitality.

In our January Annual Meeting, we voted on a budget which includes an additional half-time pastoral staff person for the second half of the year. Common Ministry has authorized a search committee to begin the process of hiring for this position, and is excited to share that its main focus will be on Community Engagement—helping Union to "make the Christ Spirit dominant in our lives, and in all human relations" by expanding our work of inclusion, justice, and love beyond our walls.

When I think of what resurrection looks like, what renewal and vitality look like, it's living the Gospel in the world. It's connecting with other people and organizations to further the Christ Spirit in the world. It's doing what we can to transform all human relations with the Spirit's love. Resurrection looks like helping our church to have the resources we need to be agents of God's abundant grace.




Your Church Library

Varied Themes in Children's Books for Easter


Two of the Easter-themed picture books in the church library feature Ukrainian Easter eggs, lovely wax-resist dye creations that celebrate spring and new life. Both books are by Patricia Polacco, a prolific author/illustrator who draws on her diverse family ties in producing these books.

In <u>Chicken Sunday</u>, the eggs forge a relationship between an elderly storekeeper and some "rotten kids." <u>Rechenka's Eggs</u>, set in Russia, centers the cherished eggs in a folk tale that highlights their life-giving property.

<u>Petook</u> is a story in which Jesus is part of a background in the witness of a rooster. All three books are a subtle way to experience the damage and rebirth themes of the season.

Beyond colored eggs and new clothes for spring, Easter can be a hard story to talk about with children. The story takes place in historical time — the crucifixion — and outside of historical time — the resurrection. The first is a cruel act of the Roman Empire, the second a story that rubs against our science-based grasp of what really happens.

The Light of the World, by acclaimed author Katherine Paterson, is a simply worded but sound biography of Jesus that elides the cruel aspects of the crucifixion. Peter's First Easter expands the role of this disciple, as he becomes an eyewitness to the several Easter week scenes recorded in the Gospels. While the fictionalization by former Lutheran pastor Walter Wangerin might seem presumptuous, it speaks to how these events coalesced for the disciples in the new movement that became Christianity.



A final offering for Easter is the text-heavy <u>The Very First Easter</u>. The illustrations, despite the characters westernized appearance, are dramatic and evocative. For a younger child, you might want to "read the pictures" rather than the informative narration.

All of these books, plus a few more, are in the basket under the window in the church library. Happy reading!

If you have the equipment but don't know how to "press the right buttons" to join a Zoom meeting, fear not! We can arrange "training"!

Again, if this sounds like it might be a fun thing to try, please do contact us—don't wait to see if others will do so: if we don't get any response to this "ad," the project will be shelved. That's no small gift—to participate in the resurrection of Jesus! As we continue our Easter celebration of new life, let's continue Union's legacy of generosity through this special offering.


Spring Bulb Fundraiser



Union's Second Church after it was remodeled in 1914.

Three buildings have housed Union Church in its 186 years of existence. Our second building was dedicated 140 years ago this month.

Below is excerpt of an article from the Green Bay Advocate, dated April 6, 1882, that marked the occasion. (Note: *The church changed its name from First Presbyterian to Union Congregational in 1899.*)

Dedication of the Presbyterian Church.

The formal dedication of the new Presbyterian church edifice took place on Sunday last, and was an event long to be remembered in the history of the society. The original church edifice of the society was erected in 1838 and dedicated Sept. 9th of that year, being the second Protestant house of worship in Wisconsin, the other one being at Stockbridge. This church was in 1880 the oldest in the State (the Stockbridge church not being used for worship) and was destroyed by our great fire on Sept. 20, 1880.

The congregation immediately took steps to rebuild the church, on the site formerly occupied by the parsonage, which was also destroyed, and every energy has been bent toward the realization of

that purpose, now accomplished. The plans were prepared by Mr. J. McDonnell, architect, of this city, and the contract was taken by Schwarz & Voight, Ft. Howard. The building is wood, early English style architecture, irregular in its outline, but harmonious and pleasing to the eye. It is 94x64 feet on the ground, with auditorium 50 ft. 6 in. by 60 ft. 6 in., with vestry and classrooms connected with the auditorium by folding doors—these rooms making an addition to the auditorium of 32x62 feet. The ceiling of the auditorium is 28 feet high, with open timber roof, the ribs arching upward from the corners. The windows are stained glass of handsome pattern. The tower proper is 17 feet square and 54 feet high, surmounted by a spire 60 feet high, and that by an ornamental iron finial 14 feet highmaking the entire height 124 feet.



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Union Joins In "No Mow May"

Union will be participating in "No Mow May," a conservation initiative that encourages people to stop mowing or mow less often for the month of May to create habitat and provide resources for bees and other early-season pollinators. This is particularly important in urban areas where floral resources are often limited. First popularized by Plantlife, an organization based in the United Kingdom, No Mow May is gaining traction across North America.

In May, many municipalities, including Green Bay, will relax enforcement of long-grass rules, allowing residents to delay or reduce lawn cutting as a way to promote pollinator-friendly habitat early in the growing season. Participation is voluntary; however, in many municipalities **online registration and posting a city-issued yard sign is required**. Google "No Mow May" and your city's name to learn of specific requirements or visit the Green Bay Botanical Garden's website, gbbg.org/ and search for "No Mow May" to learn more.
