

## With God All Things Are Possible

One of my favorite scripture verses is Luke 1:37, "With God, all things are possible."

Sure, some of why I like it is that it's hopeful. Optimistic. It draws us toward the bright side of life.

But I also find it inspirational because it first leans on God. We're going to be able to do great things, but that greatness is predicated on the presence of the divine.

This scripture comes to mind as our congregation will later this month kick off a Feasibility Study for a proposed Capital Campaign. There are numerous projects proposed, some essential (like replacing the roof on the west side of the church hall) and some that are more missional (like overhauling the former Mayflower spaces to make them more conducive to our Faith Formation needs and those of On the Mark Dyslexia Clinic and the proposed solar installation on one of the church's flat roofs).

What strikes me about all of the proposed projects is that they all support, whether directly or indirectly, Union's mission to make the Christ Spirit dominant in our lives and in all human relations.

The cover of the Feasibility Study brochure that you'll receive in the mail later this month starts with the headline, "All Are Welcome," based on the Marty Haugen hymn that we sometimes sing in worship:

Let us build a house
Where love can dwell
And all can safely live
A place where
Saints and children tell
How hearts learn to forgive
Built of hopes and dreams and visions
Rock of faith and vault of grace
Here the love of Christ shall end divisions
All are welcome, all are welcome
All are welcome in this place

I'm really proud that our congregation has worked to make this a reality. That Union is a house of God where love dwells, and that in both word and action we strive to be a community in which all can safely live, especially those who have been told by other churches that they don't belong. We are a vital witness of God's absolute, unfaltering love.

And so I'm excited to see where this Feasibility Study leads us. Over the next month and a half, you'll have the opportunity to complete surveys, participate in listening sessions, and be interviewed by representatives from the James Company, the capital campaign consultancy firm that was secured by Common Ministry. You will both be invited to give feedback on the project list as well as be invited to give insight into your willingness to support the campaign financially. The James Company will then write a report of this data and make a recommendation to Common Ministry as to whether the congregation has indicated that we have the wherewithal to undertake a campaign.

Through all of this, I come back to Luke 1:37, "With God, all things are possible." I am firmly convinced that the work and mission of this congregation is vital, that we are doing deep, meaningful work that builds up Jesus' core values of love and hope and justice. And so, I'm going to keep on praying that we, together with God, will lend our resources to this grand project. This building is mission. May God work through it and us to make this world a better place, both for us and for our neighbors near and far.

## Go Green! Go Solar!

As a follow-up to the lightly attended March 2022 meeting regarding the solar panel project that Mark Smith shepherded from inception to proposal status, Lou Norsetter and I met this summer to understand how other UCC churches in Wisconsin chose to implement a solar panel project, their experiences with their utility and the installation, and the lessons learned.

We investigated six UCC installations as well as the Bay Settlement Community of the Sisters of St. Francis. The interviews covered a variety of situations from powering an 1880s clapboard at St. Paul's UCC in Colgate to the modern Trost Center of the Wisconsin Conference UCC. Others included Middleton Community Church, First Congregational Madison, Plymouth UCC in Madison, and Wisconsin Rapids UCC.

Most projects had a starting point of wanting to do something green. Some churches had congregation members with experience in home solar; others began their projects at the request of a pastor. Like Union, congregations favored the projects but had some uncertainty about the details.

But once the churches took the big leap, they found that their contractors were strong and proactive partners, spotting and fixing small issues quickly. Because there are few moving parts in a solar installation, there was no maintenance. The after-the-fact consensus was positive, strongly positive.

But as we all know, the devil (and the delight) is in the details: sizing the installation, understanding the utility reimbursement for excess power, thinking through future needs for electricity such as auto charging stations, uncovering the tax incentives for congregation members, and the cost savings offered by new legislation.

Lou and I will be communicating more about the solar project in future months. We invite interested congregation members to join our work group!

For starters, let's all learn more by visiting the Bay Settlement array that the Sisters of St. Francis have installed based on their needs and values. Their contractor was Eland Electric, the one who offered us the most attractive proposal last winter. We plan to offer a light lunch on Sunday, September 25, at 11:30 a.m., then travel to Bay Settlement for a short tour. Plenty of time to be home for the Packers! If you can help us continue this important ministry, please consider donating monetarily through the church giving website. Thank you.






## Your Church Library

## Recent Gifts to the Church Library


In the aftermath of COVID and the lack of a used book sale, the church library has added fewer books than usual this year. But the few that have come our way are interesting, and we are grateful to the givers for the gifts.


Before leaving for North Carolina, Sylvia Garrido gave us Anne Rice's highly imaginative life of Jesus novel, <u>The Road to Cana</u>. Published in 2008, it was a sequel to <u>Christ the Lord: Out of Egypt</u> and part of a projected four-book series. Rice confronted severe medical issues related to diabetes in 2004, prompting her return to the Catholic faith. By 2013, she had separated from organized religion but did not lose her relationship with Jesus. On Amazon

she is quoted, "I have always written about outsiders, about outcasts, about those whom others tend to shun or persecute. And it does seem that I write a lot about their interaction with others like them and their struggle to find some community of their own." This sentiment rings true of her supernatural novels and her life of Christ books. Rice died in 2021.

Friend of the church, Anneliese Waggoner, has given us Jane Goodall's <u>A Prayer for World Peace</u>. This slender book, copiously illustrated by Iranian artist Feeroozeh Golmohammadi, urges us to care for all creation – people, animals and ecosystems. Goodall says, "Lasting peace between peoples will never come about unless we learn to respect and live in harmony with nature."

Judy Larmouth donated the book, <u>Along the</u> Migrant Trail: A Borderlands Portrait. Judy traveled





to the borderlands with a Union group a few years ago. This series of images recalls the tribulations, the needs and the welcome offered by some to those crossing the desert between Mexico and the U.S. as refugees from violence and poverty.

These gifts reflect in prayer, in pilgrimage and imagination, living with the Christ spirit dominant. They and other books are in the basket under the window in the church library. Happy reading!

## October-November Seminary Secrets Series Why Is Mark So Dark?

Most Christians have a hard time keeping the four Gospels straight. That is, most have a "harmonized" story of Jesus in their heads, which they've learned from children's Bibles, Sunday School, sermons, and snippets of Scripture read in church on Sundays. But the four biblical Gospels were written at different times, by different authors who lived in different communities. Hence, when each Gospel is studied closely, unique characteristics become apparent.

#### For example, here are some fun facts about the Gospel of Mark:

- Mark is our earliest Gospel, written about 70 CE (AD).
- Mark is full of gloom and doom about Jesus' fate as one destined to die humiliated and abandoned by all, even his Father.
- Why is Mark dark?
  - \* It was written just after the Jewish-Roman war, which involved a brutal three-year starvation siege of Jerusalem; the war ended when the Romans breached the city walls and destroyed the Temple and most of the city.
  - \* Mark's community was under persecution; the temptation to abandon loyalty to Jesus was acute.
- How does Mark compare to the other Gospels?
  - \* Mark was the basis for both Matthew and Luke, and shares much of its material with those two. Those Gospels had access to a list of Jesus' sayings (scholars call "Q"); Mark apparently did not. This fact, together with Mark's dark outlook, uniquely shaped its theology and themes.
  - \* Since Mark lacked access to Q, his Gospel is the shortest and most concise. It's action packed, with fewer sayings and parables. Compared to John, Mark's story-line, picture of Jesus, and overall theology are dramatically different.

Studying each Gospel on its own terms is an eye-opening experience! Therefore, this academic year, we will focus on studying the Gospels, using the standard tools of biblical criticism. We'll start with Mark, then go on to Luke. Since Matthew and John have been covered in recent years, we'll consider whether we want to review those as well. All of this will create the foundation necessary for an in-depth study of the historical Jesus, the final topic in this year's series. No prior biblical knowledge is necessary, so please don't hesitate to join in!

# Love Life Diaper Drive

Union Church's annual diaper drive for Love Life began Sunday, September 11 and will run through October 9. Love Life is supported by many local churches and the United Way.

The drive provides a partial supply of diapers, formula and gently used clothing for low income families with children ages 0 to 3 who are in the WIC program. Newborns are given a layette with a collection of clothing, blankets and care items needed for their first few weeks. Each child gets a new outfit and a book at birthday time. At age three, they are given materials to promote toilet training and they leave the program.

A package of diapers contains 50 diapers, which can be collected once a month. In August, 178 packages were provided to 148 families. That works out to 8,900 diapers distributed in one month! The sizes most needed are 4, 5, and 6. Also, because of the recent formula shortage which limited the amount one could buy, formula is needed. Most used are cans of Similac, any variety.

In short, Love Life needs diapers sizes 4, 5 and 6 and also cans of Similac formula. Donations can be placed in the container in the coat room at church.

The families are so grateful for this assistance. Thanks in advance for helping give our youngest citizens a good start in life.

Tamra Oman (see above) is the statewide director for the EXPO FREE campaign. What is FREE? FREE is an organization of formerly incarcerated women associated with the EXPO organization. EXPO works to restore the rights and dignity of those affected by the criminal justice system. FREE and EXPO are in the process of developing a presence in the Green Bay area.

The FREE Campaign was founded in 2016 by women who are members of EXPO Wisconsin, when they began to notice the lack of discussion of women's particular incarceration challenges. Led by people who are directly impacted, EXPO (Ex-Incarcerated People Organizing) is committed to dismantling all systems that support mass incarceration and excessive supervision. EXPO exists so that people with shared experience of incarceration are able to build collective power to change the climate of incarceration in Wisconsin. EXPO is an affiliate of WISDOM, a faith-based community organization in Wisconsin.


