

Union's Budget by the Numbers

As we focus on Loving Our Neighbors...No Exceptions in our Stewardship Campaign this fall, my last few email columns to you have been stories of how Union makes a difference in real people's lives. We mailed home a beautiful color brochure that uses pictures and words to help you to weigh in on a possible Capital Campaign early next year. My preaching this fall has centered on Union's "why." That is, why does it matter that our church exists? In all of this, we hope to share a robust snapshot of who Union is and what we're about.

Today, I'd like to share stewardship from a different angle: Union by the numbers. All month, we've been talking about the human interest stories your stewardship enables, but sometimes, it's hard to envision what our pledges do concretely. And so here is a different snapshot - from Union's ledgers:

\$951 What we spend on our music ministry on a weekly basis.

\$763 What we spent last year on curriculum for youth Faith Formation.

\$520 Is what we spend on health insurance every week.

\$400 What Worship Ministry budgets yearly for flowers, in addition to the flowers you provide.

\$266 Keeps us in altar candles.

\$227 Pays for the ingredients to make the evening meal for over 100 people at the NEW Community Shelter.

\$80 Cost budgeted to provide Wednesday night dinners for all who are interested.

\$55 Keeps our telephones and internet on for a week.

\$47 What we spend for an average week's office supplies and machines.

\$19 Our JOSHUA membership dues breaks down to this much per week.

\$11 Is what it costs to provide coffee hour each week.

Let's Fill an Ark—Heifer Sunday is October 30

Heifer International works with communities to end world hunger and poverty. Through our Heifer Living Gift Market we hope to inspire our church family to get involved in ending hunger and poverty, bringing the commandment to love your neighbor to life year-round.

Those who receive our gift not only benefit from the animal, but they also pass on the gift to other families. This allows them to help others as you helped them.

Our goal is to fill an ark. This can be with your gift of a goat, water buffalo, alpaca, llama, sheep, pig, fish fingerlings, rabbits, honeybees, ducks, chickens, and more.

Union Members Explore Solar Savings and Impact

On Sunday, September 25, Union members toured the solar garden of the Sisters of Saint Francis on Nicolet Drive, Green Bay. Sisters Rose and Mary walked us through several green efforts the community has undertaken to reduce their need for fossil fuel. Their commitment to earth care and to finding the means to enact their commitment was impressive. While their fundraising was robust, it initially seemed not quite enough and the Sisters proceeded on faith. In the last hour, a family estate gift completed their need.

The Sisters' first solar array was installed in 2014. They saw significant improvements in efficiency with the second installation in 2019. Their garden has reduced their electric costs by 50%.

At Union, we are considering a smaller solar application to reduce our electric grid dependence. This investment is an asset that repays its cost over time. Importantly, it would decrease our use of mostly coal-

fueled electricity from WPS, helping us to care for God's creation as spoken of in Genesis.

The Mayflower wing rooftop where the solar panels would be mounted has been examined and assessed as safe by Berners Schober Architects and Engineering. The 42 panels would have a shallow slope and will not be visible from the street. Wisconsin's cooler temperatures are good for the equipment and they make electricity in all seasons.

The list cost for the project in spring of 2022 was \$48,000 reduced by \$6,000 to \$42,000 using grants secured by Mark Smith. According to information offered in a UCC denomination webinar, through the new Inflation Reduction Act, we expect the church to be eligible to save 30% of the total cost, or an additional \$14,400 over the initial estimate. More details about the cost saving and an updated estimate will be available in February of 2023.

The Blessing Box: Two Years of Growth and Counting!

The Blessing Box is an outdoor, 24/7, self-service, nopaperwork-required food pantry. Since it began, many have been served and much has been learned!

2020 — The Blessing Box opened in the summer of 2020, offering food, household, and personal care items to meet a variety of individual and family needs. A goal was established to restock the pantry three times a week, with items received via monthly congregational food drives.

2021 — Our second year brought significant and sustained acceleration in usage, and the team struggled to keep pace. The Blessing Box began to empty within hours of restocking and food drive donations depleted quickly, creating frequent shortages. In response, a decision was made to use Blessing Box cash donations to purchase inventory to supplement items received via monthly food drives. The goal was to ensure sufficient supply on hand to stock the Blessing Box three times per week. We also implemented a process to count and track inventory so we could more effectively monitor our rate of usage, identify changes needed to what we offer and improve our ability to estimate replenishment needs.

2022 — Our current goal is to stock the Blessing Box to approximately 100% full, three times per week. Here is our projection for the month of November 2022:

Items needed per week: 325 (to supply three restocks)

Items needed for the month: 1,300 Projected food drive item donations: 225

Projected items needed via inventory purchasing: 1,075 Inventory purchasing budget status: We project current cash donation funds to last about 2-1/2 months.

How Best to Help!
