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Divine Ambiguity Exhibit


Every once in a while, we fall into something extraordinary.

So it is with how the new art exhibit that will open in Union's church hall this Sunday, Divine Ambiguity by Sheboygan artist Toril Fisher, came into being.

A colleague of mine knows Fisher, and said, "I think this exhibit would go over really well at Union."

When I saw the images I didn't think twice.

Divine Ambiguity is collection of twelve pieces Fisher



Each of the people is portrayed with a gold leaf halo. The message is not subtle. The divine, the sacred, is just as immutably present in the people our world dehumanizes as it is in everyone else. Perhaps even more so.

The leaflet for the exhibit describes Fisher's motivation for creating the series. "Dehumanization denies the dignity, consideration, compassion, and empathy that we typically give other people. Dehumanizing language pollutes the debate, blocks solutions to social problems, and can relax our instinctive aversion to aggression and violence. 'Divine Ambiguity: Reclaiming the Sacred' promotes a celebration of humanity."

When making plans for Union to host the exhibit, my original thought had been to display the paintings in Bagby Chapel, a pretty, quiet, reflective space.

But the more I prayed about it, it became clear: I wanted these people to be with us on our Lenten journey, to be with us when we eat and play and learn and pray. We do all of those things in the church hall, and so I invite you to see these paintings as divine guests of ours for the season. Remember them. Think of their needs. Go out of your way to figure out how to help those they represent feel more at home in your life and in our church. Make a point to make them, and Fisher's message of compassion, understanding, and seeing the Divine in everyone and everything, part of your Lenten repentance and conversion.

As luck would have it, when I proposed this space, Fisher immediately agreed, and pointed out that when the light is just right, the gold leaf halos behind the figures will shimmer and glow!

We're opening this exhibit on the day our church celebrates Transfiguration, the end of the Epiphany Season, or Season of Light. On Sunday, we'll read about Jesus glowing, dazzling, after he and some of his disciples climb a mountain. Then, we'll climb the stairs to our church hall to contemplate how divinity dazzles within people on the edges of society.

Fisher will be with us in Coffee Hour on Sunday for the opening, and the exhibit will be up through Easter, April 9. Please plan to take time to join with us in thanking Fisher on Sunday, and to come back some time during Lent to soak in the Divine Ambiguity.

The exhibit is free and open to the public February 19 through April 9, Monday through Friday 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. and on Sunday mornings 9 a.m. to noon. All are welcome. No appointment necessary.


Work Day is Sunday, February 19

Five Prophetic Voices Documentary Series

Our film and discussion series returns this year after a three-year pandemic hiatus.

The Season of Lent calls us to reflection about what our faith means and meditation on the lives of those who have lived their faith with prophetic love and justice. The renowned documentarian, Martin Doblmeier, created a series of award-winning films portraying the faithful genius of five persons who lived a pioneering witness in the modern world. Union will have a Sunday evening Lenten series, February 26 through March 26, using these documentaries, followed by group reaction and discussion led by Michael Lukens.

We will share a soup supper at 5:30 p.m., with the film at 6:00 and discussion at 7:00. Each documentary portrays a prophetic and dynamic figure that has powerfully influenced faith in contemporary life: Dietrich Bonhoeffer, Reinhold Niebuhr, Howard Thurman, Dorothy Day, and Abraham Heschel.

Blessing Box Food Drives Move to Communion Sundays

The Blessing Box outside the Mayflower entrance continues to provide a vital service for those in need. Although the Blessing Box may be empty when you walk past it, be assured that it is filled with a variety of items three times a week. Because the need is so great, we are now holding Food Drives on Communion Sundays, the next being March 5.

This shift to Communion Sundays can save a trip for people who are already coming to church, while also symbolically linking our spiritual meal with our neighbors' real life need for meals.

All donations are appreciated, but items of greatest need during the winter include ready-to-eat microwave meals and pouches of chicken, tuna or pulled pork. Donated items can be placed on the steps around the baptismal font on Communion Sundays or in the Blessing Box Bin located near the church office.

Joining the Green Effort

In the past few months, we put out a call to interested Union members to become part of the church's green strategy. We had one enthusiastic and knowledgeable respondent: Amanda Hatton, who recently joined Union with her family. The Hattons have solar panels on their house, electric vehicles, a robust composting system, and chickens.

But it didn't happen all at once for the Hattons. It began with living out a conviction to become more earth-friendly and taking care of what God has given. Amanda realized that green efforts are investments and assets that pay their way and contribute to a reduction in greenhouse gases. Still Amanda asked herself, "How do I do this for the least amount of money, because I don't have a lot of money."

Composting was a low-cost place to start. The idea to have chickens came out of Amanda's daughter's interest in birds. These social egg producers are a natural pest patrol for the home food garden and they complete the composting cycle.

As the family added an all-electric vehicle to the plug-in hybrid they purchased in 2018, Amanda became more familiar with phone accessible charging station groups for longer trips. The solar panels were installed in 2019.

As her practices continue to evolve, Amanda began buying milk in returnable glass bottles as part of a general strategy to reduce single use plastic. She observed, "There's another piece of the familiar reduce – reuse – recycle practice, and that's to refuse."

Your Church Library


"Climate Church, Climate World"

The church library has acquired a few books on how the reality of climate change interacts with personal and church responsibilities. One of them came out in 2018 and was written by Jim Antal, the former Massachusetts UCC Conference minister and a veteran of more than 20 years of climate activism. It's called <u>Climate Church</u>, <u>Climate World</u>. There's an updated version coming out in March 2023.

I wanted to like the book more than I did, but that's not to say I wouldn't recommend reading it. Antal throws wads of scripture, theology, ethics, church practices and activism at the wall to see what sticks. He embraces the importance of moral indignation which propels



urgency—a laundry list of "we musts"—and self-examination that seeks to be reconciled to the earth and its fullness. Drawing from Brueggemann's The Prophetic Imagination, Antal repeatedly asks us to "imagine if."

Antal quotes important justice voices such as Wendell Berry, Desmond Tutu, Pope Francis, and Abraham Joshua Hershel. These short excerpts reflect sustained arguments for the urgency to act and grief for climate change consequences. Tutu sums up, "[Jesus'] supreme work is to reconcile us to God and to one another and, indeed, to reconcile us to all of God's creation." And that's the crux for Antal. Addressing the consequences of a changing climate does not supersede the classic work of the church, but lifts up a neglected dimension.

In lifting up how a congregation can become reconciled to the earth, Antal sketches out some possibilities: a sacrament of dirt to enlarge our anthropocentric focus, recognizing our accountability to future generations as a form of loving our neighbors, and civil disobedience. His book is chock full of peaceful protests that worked to voice concerns and pressure law makers to grapple with the science and consequences of rising temperatures.

With the passage of the Inflation Reduction Act, the nation is accepting the narrative Antal and others have been preaching for decades. This sets the stage for how churches and congregants will choose to mitigate their carbon footprints.

Anyone interested in crafting some suggestions for Worship Ministry, Stewardship Ministry or Common Ministry would do well to look at the writing of Antal and his mentors. I'd be happy to convene a study/action group. Meanwhile, the book is in the basket under the windows in the church library along with additional resources.


