


Living and Loving

If you've spent much time with us at Union in the past decade, you've heard me talk about living our baptismal promises.

Most often, when people think of living the congregation's promise to love, support, and care for an individual, they think of being active in our child and youth ministries—teaching Faith Formation, leading Youth Group, offering Children's Moments and even cooking for our Wednesday night dinners.

Over the years, I've encouraged the congregation to think of that promise even more broadly—it plays out in how we care for one another when we're sick, when we're grieving—and I've challenged us to understand that how we treat the poor and vulnerable and how we respond to systemic injustice is wrapped up in our baptismal promises, too.

One area that I haven't delved into when encouraging us to live our baptismal promises is our family life, but



these promises are exactly what come to mind as I read Dr. Rolf Lulloff's new book, Living and Loving with Parkinson's Disease: Our Partnership Through a 45-Year Journey. A longtime Union member, Dr. Lulloff weaves spirituality throughout as he tells of learning of his wife Annie's early onset Parkinson's Disease and how the couple navigated those waters.

Of the couple, Dr. Ann McKee, MD, director of the Boston University CTE Center and UNITE Brain Bank says, "The sense of despair that often accompanies the loss of control from Parkinson's can be overwhelming. Rolf

and Annie Lulloff are great examples of how focusing on love and resilience makes it possible to enjoy a fulfilling quality of life."

Not only does focusing on love and resilience result in a fulfilling quality of life, I would suggest that the practice of those two virtues is yet another manifestation of our baptismal promises. Anyone who spent time with the Lulloffs in the 31 years after Annie was diagnosed quickly saw that love was the singular motivator in their existence. They practiced what Jesus preached.

The description of Living and Loving with Parkinson's Disease on Amazon describes the book as "part love story and part how-to guide for all participants in a care partnership. Care persons, their spouses, and extended family and friends will benefit from the tips and care suggestions."

Dr. Lulloff will be with us in Coffee Hour on September 24 to sign books and share insights, and will be back to discuss the book in our Adult Faith Formation hour on Sunday, January 7.

Speak with the Earth



In December 2022 at the United Nations Biodiversity Conference, 188 nations signed a Global Biodiversity pledge which addressed biodiversity loss, ecosystems and indigenous rights. Concrete measures included putting 30 percent of the planet and 30 percent of degraded ecosystems under protection by 2030.

Sojourners Magazine reported in a follow up to that agreement, Irish bishops have issued a "strong recommendation" to its parishes to set aside 30 percent of their church yards for pollinators and habitat to increase biodiversity.

Could Union Church adopt a 30 percent pledge to action? I believe we could.



Of the 83,100 square feet the church owns for its use, 27.7 percent is green space. It's a patchwork to be sure: the courtyard garden, the Memorial Garden, a large stretch at the Jefferson end of the parking lot, the former Biblical Garden and two strips along the parking lot arm that extends to Cass Street.

At this point about half our green space is slotted for habitat renewal. Habitat renewal means planting native trees, shrubs and plants and removing invasives. It means slowly transitioning from non-natives that have no food or hosting use for the rapidly dwindling insect population and the group of birds who depend on insects, as we do ourselves. It means removing two large invasive species trees in the courtyard and two long invasive species hedges along the parking lot arm. It means selecting native species when the yews which are impacting the stone joints at the churches foundation are removed.

Plants and landscapes have emotional value. I am aware of trees given in memory of loved ones and of transplants from the Women's Fellowship courtyard. Claudia Doelger cares for the courtyard rose garden as if it were her own. Achim and Kathy Seifert maintain and improve the courtyard garden with an eye to beauty and color. Memorial Garden caretaker Robert Johnson remembers Katie Small and her garden loves when tending the space. Moving toward habitat should not steamroll these affections, just influence next steps.

Next steps are important. By taking them, we open ourselves to a new way of thinking and a new way of reading scripture. Many of us already find a sense of the holy in nature – fishing, hiking, being. Christians are not alone in this as Karen Armstrong explains in "Sacred Nature." Yet the non-human natural world needs to be rediscovered as pastor Daniel Cooperrider does in "Speak with the Earth and It Will Teach You: A Field Guide to the Bible." Cooperrider is the keynote speaker for the Wisconsin Conference Creation Care meeting at the UCC Daycholah Conference Center in October. Stay tuned, more to come!

A Special Ties to Mexico Meets October 15

- May 2: Outreach Ministry approved the service project of making blankets for asylum-seeking migrants arriving in Mexico.
- June/July/August: Union Church members met on the second Wednesday of each month to tie fleece and flannel blankets.
- August 13: Ninety-four (94) blankets were blessed during worship.
- August 15: The bags were transferred, in Shawano, to a member of Black Mountain UCC Church in Scottsdale, Arizona. Eight days later, they arrived at Black Mountain and on August 28, the blankets were given to the Centro de Esperanza Refugee Resource Center in Sonoyta, Mexico! Such a project; such a journey!


