

Normally, my October newsletter article has something to do with stewardship and generosity. Not to be formulaic, but the October newsletter is always mailed in the middle of our annual pledge campaign, and so it's a reasonable communication tool to tell some of the stories of the vital ministry we do as Union Congregational United Church of Christ, and in turn to encourage you to be generous in your financial support of that ministry.

But this is not a normal year.

As the death toll in Gaza climbs and two U.S. aircraft carriers and other forces are now amassing in the Mediterranean, this isn't a normal October.

And yet, being able to reflect with you, ever so briefly, about the state of the world IS part of what makes Union special. Whereas I have colleagues who lament that their churches wouldn't tolerate hearing about world events from the pastor, Union is the exact opposite. Since the latest fighting broke out two weeks ago, I've heard from numerous church members asking for help making sense of the horrors unfolding in front of us.

Now, while a two-page newsletter article gives us nowhere the amount of time needed to process the centuries of strife in the Middle East and the complexity of the current situation, what we do have time to do is turn to Jesus' sermon on the mount. Many forget that, along with the Beatitudes (the "blessed are theys") are Jesus' teachings to go the extra mile, give not only one's cloak but also one's tunic, turn the other cheek. If you've been part of Union long enough, you've heard me unpacking those teachings, helping folks to understand that Jesus wasn't telling his followers to "just roll over and take it," but rather that utilizing creative alternative means is the only chance we're going to find our way out of this mess.

The quote at the top of this article is a powerful modern day iteration of that teaching. There is no way that more violence, more killing of civilians, more fueling of hatred and grudges is going to move either side forward.

Rabbi Moishe Steigmann and I had only met a handful of times before the tragic shooting at Tree of Life Synagogue in Pittsburgh in 2018. In the aftermath of that horror, I organized a candlelight vigil the next Shabbat, to wrap the congregants of Congregation Cnesses Israel in light and peace as they gathered for prayer. Hundreds lined the streets and sang "Let There Be Peace On Earth." In the ensuing years, Rabbi Moishe has become a friend from afar (he lives in Milwaukee) and a trusted voice of wisdom in my life. Late last week, he wrote this:

The reality of why I haven't posted--is that, through all this, despite my "wants," I have mostly been feeling...numb. Incapacitated. Disillusioned. Almost defeated.

Yet, at the same time, I don't ever want to lose my humaneness, my sense of decency, and my compassion for anyone and everyone suffering in Israel and in the Palestinian territories. And I haven't been able to reconcile the two.

How do I call out those who supported or elected terrorists in the first place without ceding my compassion for the interminable plight that drove them there? How do I call a government for ongoing provocation without ignoring the pain their people have suffered from decades of bombings? How do I reconcile my belief that Hamas must simply be destroyed with the potential casualties that it will necessitate? How do I balance the dignity of life, the indignity of murder and killing, the urgency of war, and the scar that they sear on the soul?

So I've retreated. I've hidden.

I know what my head wants: I want to rant, to scream, to demand justice. And I also know that is not me, is not who I am nor who I aspire to be. I couldn't reconcile the fear, disgust, and disconnect within myself with my mindful approach to Judaism and to life.

And so I stayed silent.

I share this not because my journey is necessarily unique or even instructive. I share this in part because I need to hear it for myself. But mostly I share it because numbness is a toxin. Apathy is the ally of evil. Disillusion is the champion of hate.

I hope that, shortly, I will be ready to offer my fuller voice. In the meantime, I will do my best to hold together two seemingly polar hopes: for a decisive end to Hamas' terrorism and, ultimately, for peace for all in the region.

My hope joins with Rabbi Steigmann's. May our rage be wedded to our humaneness. May we not allow ourselves the luxury of numbness, apathy, and disillusion. May we tap the energies of Jesus and Audre Lord, bringing about genuine change by finding new and different tools to bring about sustainable peace.

This is not the stewardship newsletter article I intended to write. But I'm grateful to be shepherding a congregation that not only tolerates but expects that we bring our faith to bear on the real troubles of this world.

The Earth Will Teach You

We continue our discussion regarding the book Speak with the Earth and It will Teach You. Author Daniel Cooperrider was the keynote presenter at a Wisconsin Conference Creation Care retreat held at the Daycholah Conference Center on October 14.

Cooperrider describes his book as a series of braided narratives. His intention is to foreground natural elements in the Bible, in contrast to the more common reading of Scripture which focuses on human and divine actions and relationships. And he



reads what has been called the Book of Nature, which we can think of as our own experiences immersed in the wild world.

To shape his work, Cooperrider begins with the classic philosophic elements: water, fire, earth and air then transitions within each section to concrete representations of them: rivers, mountains, trees and clouds. All four of these representations are exemplified in Biblical narratives. You only need think of the river in the Garden of Eden or Jesus' baptism in the Jordan, stories of origin. Or the mountain that Abraham climbs with Isaac or Jesus' encounter with Satan in the desert, places of significant testing.

Cooperrider draws attention to Abraham and Sarah's extravagant hospitality under the oaks of Mamre, trees which themselves are gracious hosts to a multitude of insects and birds. Entomologist Doug Tallamy has documented how oaks are the most hospitable of all trees, sheltering and feeding more than 400 caterpillar species. Forest ecologists, Peter Wohlleben (The Hidden Life of Trees) and Suzanne Simard (Finding the Mother Tree) imagined and documented the mutual aid communication webs of trees with each other and the mycorrhizal network of underground creatures. This is a wonderful example of how we can learn graciousness from the Book of Nature.

The last representation that Cooperrider writes about is clouds — Noah's rainbow in the clouds, the cloud pillar that led the Israelites, the cloud where Moses meets with God. Clouds with their myriad and morphing shapes form and dissipate as part of the water cycle. If we open our minds beyond the notion of clouds as the portents of harsh weather or hard times, clouds can lift us as they embody the ephemeral—the presence of the sacred.

Why is this important to read and reflect upon? Theologian Sallie McFague in A New Climate for Christology expresses the growing notion that we need a new origin story, one which does not put humans in a utilitarian relationship with nature, as either masters or stewards. Cooperrider places humans in the role of students of nature, sometimes as scientists but more as those who seek meaning through our mindful attention to what our natural world has to teach.

Capital Campaign Corner

Thank you to all who pledged a total of \$571,880.46 to our Building for Faith in Action Capital Campaign. As of October 15, we have received \$156,294.38 of those commitments, which is over 23% of the total pledged.

This is a healthy pace for a campaign of our size, and has allowed us to undertake all of our most critical capital projects: the new Mayflower doors are installed and functioning well and the courtyard and south sanctuary tuckpointing is completed. We are optimistic that the west church hall roof will be re-shingled before the snow flies.

Next on the list are replacing some elevator mechanicals and overhauling the Wi-Fi throughout the building. Stewardship Ministry will keep you informed as we keep completing projects, and are grateful that your pledging has already allowed us to do much needed work.


