Big Read: "A More Perfect Union"

Have you ever done something that seemed "pie in the sky" and it worked? Like inviting a nationally known speaker to Zoom and they replied "yes" within an hour?

That's what happened the other day when Steve Hartman, Union's liaison to JOSHUA, stopped by my office.

The JOSHUA Spiritual Leaders, inspired by Steve's deep and impassioned study of the topic of Christian Nationalism, had been bandying about the idea of encouraging all of the JOSHUA churches and other affiliate organizations to read "A More Perfect Union" by Adam Russell Taylor.

While Steve and I dreamed about what this Big Read might entail, I jokingly wondered if we could get Rev. Taylor to Zoom with us.

As luck would have it, after filling out a rather elaborate form on the Sojourner's website, Rev. Taylor's people said he'd be delighted to Zoom with us as a capstone to our Big Read of his book.

The publicity for the book describes it thus:

America is at a pivotal crossroads. The soul of our nation is at stake and in peril...In *A More Perfect Union*, Adam Russell Taylor, president of Sojourners, reimagines a contemporary version of (Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr.'s) Beloved Community that will inspire and unite Americans across generations, geographic and class divides, racial and gender differences, faith traditions, and ideological leanings.

In the Beloved Community, neither privilege nor punishment is tied to race, gender, religion, sexual orientation, or economic status, and everyone is able to realize their full potential and thrive. Building the Beloved Community requires living out a series of commitments,

such as true equality, radical welcome, transformational interdependence, *E Pluribus Unum* (""out of many, one""), environmental stewardship, nonviolence, and economic equity. By building the Beloved Community we unify the country around a shared moral vision that transcends ideology and partisanship, tapping into our most sacred civic and religious values, enabling our nation to live up to its best ideals and realize a more perfect union.

In initiating this Big Read, the JOSHUA Spiritual Leaders' Caucus is calling our community to actively pick up the baton as we take our turn in building up the Beloved Community. We find ourselves in a culture of strict divides with practically everyone saying, "We should do something about that." This Big Read of "A More Perfect Union" is a one small step toward a faithful response to the intense divide and suspicion in our current public discourse, a reasoned and faithful forum to forge a strong pathway forward for our Brown County community.

With a foreword by the late Representative John Lewis, "A More Perfect Union" may be just the clarion call needed for people of faith communities.

All are invited to obtain copies of "A More Perfect Union" and begin reading on the anniversary date of Rev. Dr. King's assassination, April 4, 1968. The Big Read will then gather readers in three Zoom sessions this spring, including a capstone zoom with Rev. Taylor. Watch your church communications for those dates.

There is no need to register, simply join us via the link found in your This Week at Union email for one, two, or all three of the sessions.


Our experience of the bulbs last year was wonderful, but selection does dwindle if you drag your feet.

Forgiveness Literature

Whether a hurtful act is accidental, impulsive and regretted, or deeply vicious, it is an act that cannot be taken back. The worldly expectation is of revenge or state retribution. Pardon or amnesty is the public act of halting this process and forgiveness a private, emotional response. With its emphasis on the personal, "The F Word Exhibition," addresses the acts and conversations that defy expectations and provide a humane exit from hurt.

Forgiveness literature turns often on two events: the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) sessions chaired by Archbishop Desmond Tutu and the Charleston mass murder at Mother Emmanuel Church. The church library has detailed narratives of both. No Future Without Forgiveness was written by Tutu and published in 1996. Forgiveness, while not required of those testifying, was believed to be an important part of national reconciliation. Journalist Jennifer Hawes wrote a similarly encompassing narrative of the tragic church massacre, Grace will Lead Us Home, in 2019. Many but not all of the family members of those who were killed were quick to forgive Dylann Roof in keeping with Jesus's forgiveness on the cross.

Two new books were added to the library based on a review in The Christian Century.

<u>Forgiveness: an Alternative</u> contains four discussions entitled retaliation, repentance, remission and resurrection. Written by a Harvard Divinity School professor, it is intellectually stimulating and nuanced. From the introductory comments, "Matthew Ichihashi Potts explores the complex moral terrain of forgiveness, which he claims has too often served as a salve to the conscience of power rather than as an instrument of healing or justice." Following Hannah Arendt in <u>The Human Condition</u>, he defines forgiveness as "the refusal of retaliatory violence." What Potts adds to this understanding is that the refusal comes through penitence and grief, of mourning, of living in and with the losses we cannot recover.

Philosopher Myisha Cherry has written an accessible discussion in <u>Failures of Forgiveness</u>. She covers many topics, but the key chapter comes near the end. In it, Cherry offers the idea of radical repair, in contrast to superficial repair (lip service) or thrifty repair (less risky). Radical repair gets to the root, often involving far more costly change than simply halting violence or oppression. In this regard, Blacks in South Africa today decry the absence of reparations, like the return of land, that are an unfulfilled promise of the TRC. Per Cherry, radical repair requires collaboration.

Adult Ed: Proof-texts

Have you ever been "proof-texted?" That is, has anyone ever told you that you must believe (fill in the blank), based on a few biblical verses? Likewise, has anyone ever tried to convince you that your ethical or social convictions are dangerously erroneous because Chapter X, Verse Y says so? If so, you may have felt at a loss to respond. The person you're talking with is engaging in a practice called proof-texting. Your proof-texter is able to handily quote the Bible at you and you may not know how to best counter such an argument, other than with a feeble, "Well, that's not how I look at it."

On Sunday April 7, Julie Harder will be leading an Adult Class on Proof-texts. We'll learn how to recognize a proof-text and then explore "Harder's Three Questions to Ask" when evaluating its validity. Along the way, we'll look at some of the proof-texts that have been wielded over the centuries to support far-reaching social practices and ideologies.

Capital Campaign Corner



Thank you to all who pledged a total of \$571,880.46 to our Building

for Faith in Action Capital Campaign. We have received \$265,861.44 of those commitments, which is over 46.8% of the total pledged.

This is a healthy pace for a campaign of our size. Last fall, Common Ministry authorized Stewardship Ministry to go ahead with all of our most critical capital projects: the new Mayflower doors are installed and functioning well and the courtyard and south sanctuary tuckpointing is completed. We are working with a roofer to have the west church hall roof reshingled this spring. Things are in the works to update some elevator mechanicals and the Wi-Fi throughout the building is being overhauled this month. In the sanctuary, five pews (and therefore five cushions) have been shortened as part of our commitment to accessibility, and Outreach Ministry has been granted ⅓ of the \$15,000, that is \$5,000, from the Capital Campaign funds designated for their work. Among other efforts, through these funds Union will be a Healing Sponsor of the We All Rise Juneteenth Celebration. Stewardship Ministry will keep you informed as we keep completing projects, and are grateful that your pledging has already allowed us to do much needed work.

Killoran Scholarship Fund

Thanks to Bernie and Sally Killoran, a wonderful gift is available to the youth of the church. The Killoran Scholarship provides up to \$1,500 scholarships renewable for four years of undergraduate study.

If you are a high school senior or graduate and a member of Union Church, you are eligible to apply. Applicants must enroll in a full-time undergraduate program at Lakeland University, Northland College, or any four-year school in the University of Wisconsin system.
