Becoming a WISE Church: We Need Your Voice

At Union, we believe that the Gospel calls us to love God with our whole selves—and to love our neighbors as ourselves. That means all of who we are: body, mind, heart, and soul. It means being a church that sees, welcomes, and values people as whole and holy, even, indeed especially, when we're struggling.

That's why our congregation is exploring becoming a **WISE church**: **W**elcoming, **I**nclusive, **S**upportive, and **E**ngaged in the mental health of our members and our wider community. WISE is a designation created by the United Church of Christ to help congregations faithfully respond to mental health concerns with compassion, inclusion, and action. It's rooted in the belief that all of us, whether we live with anxiety, depression, trauma, addiction, neurodivergence, or simply the wear and tear of a stressful world, are beloved by God and belong fully in the life of the church.

We know mental health touches all of our lives. National statistics tell us that 1 in 5 adults in the U.S. experiences a mental health challenge in any given year. For youth, that number is even higher. And nearly all of us, whether directly or indirectly, have been impacted by these struggles. Unfortunately, stigma around mental health still prevents many people from seeking the support they need. Too often, people suffer silently, even in the places that should feel safest.

The good news is this: the church can be a place of healing, honesty, and hope. In fact, it already is. Many people turn first to a faith community when they are struggling. Our work is to make sure that when they do, they are met with real welcome and lasting support—not just in our words, but in our worship, our leadership, our programs, our prayers, and our priorities.

That's where you come in.



In May, this family purchased the house they have been living in for the past three years as part of the EPH program. Your Church Library


Fiction Additions

Every year the church library benefits from the book sale in two ways. First, we raise some money to supplement our book and supply budget. Second, we receive some newer popular fiction that we add to our fiction section. This is an area that turns over consistently. By our records, only about five fiction volumes remain from the time the library catalog became electronic and online in 2012.

You can search the catalog from home. <u>Librarything.com/catalog/UnionCongUCC</u> is the web address. The catalog is built on top of Excel so there is a search box or you can reorder the columns – author, title, date, Dewey Decimal number, etc. – to inspect the collection in different ways.



Anyway, we added quite a lot of fiction this round. We now have several William Kent Krueger Cork O'Connor mysteries, with the newest his 2014 "Windigo Island," and the four newer Louise Penny Inspector Gamache mysteries through "A Grey Wolf." These series are shelved in the mystery section with pink M labels. If you are a fan of either series and would like to donate some to fill out our collection, we would welcome them!

Other popular books we added were Kristin Hannah's "The Four Winds," "The Great Alone," and "The Women." Author of more than 20 novels, Hannah is a master of emotional storytelling with strong women living at significant junctures in modern American history.

Another gift was the first three North of the Tension Line novels that take place in Door County. Author J. F. Riordan has been called a "modern day Jane Austen" who chronicles the comic and intriguing in small-town living. Both Riordan and Hannah are shelved in the regular fiction section to the left as you enter the library.

Remember, church library books have no due date or fines though prompt returns are appreciated. To check out, use the card in the back of the book. Enter your name and the date and year of borrowing.

All-Church Retreat

September 5-7, 2025

Our All-Church Retreat is a weekend of fun, fellowship, and reflection. The retreat takes place at Moon Beach Camp which is in St. Germain just west of Eagle River and is part of the Outdoor Ministry program of the United Church of Christ. It sits on the shores of Moon Lake and Little Saint Germain Lake. Cabins overlook Moon Lake, and each is furnished, heated, and has a bathroom with a shower. There is a beautiful lodge, and the camp is fully staffed with helpful people.

People arrive Friday evening, partaking of snacks and fellowship time around the lodge fireplace. We are treated to three meals on Saturday and brunch on Sunday. Camp staff will again offer a Saturday morning program for our children at the same time as the adult session.

Afternoons and evenings are up to you. There will be activities, planned and impromptu. There is a beach with watercraft, hiking trails and places to sit, read and reflect. Evening is game time with ice cream sundaes and a bonfire.

Sunday, we enjoy brunch and worship informally. We are usually on our way by 11 o'clock.

Cost for the retreat is \$190 per adult and \$35 per child. Financial aid is available (talk to Pastor Bridget). You can sign up to attend the retreat by contacting the church office, or by filling out the form at left or those available at Union Central.


