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Becoming a WISE Congregation: What We Learned This Summer

This summer, our congregation took an important step in exploring what it might mean for Union to become a WISE (Welcoming, Inclusive, Supportive, and Engaged) church around mental health. WISE is a United Church of Christ initiative that invites congregations to covenant together to take mental health seriously as a matter of faith, compassion, and justice.

As part of this discernment, 39 members and friends of Union participated in our WISE Survey. The results offer a snapshot of the realities many of us face and the longings we hold for a supportive, spiritually grounded community.

When asked about coping strategies for difficult times, the top responses included walking or physical exercise (90%), prayer or meditation (82%), talking to a trusted friend, pastor, or counselor (82%), and spending time in nature (72%). These results tell us that people already have tools for resilience, but they also highlight the importance of relationships, spirituality, and creation as essential to mental well-being.

When asked about the hardest feelings to manage, stress and feeling overwhelmed (53%) came in highest, followed by anxiety (39%), grief (36%), compassion fatigue (33%), and loneliness (28%). These are not abstract statistics—they are the lived experiences of people sitting in our pews and walking alongside us in daily life.

Participants were then invited to imagine what kinds of support our faith community could offer. Half of respondents named the need for help with "big issue" anxiety, and many highlighted connecting spirituality to mental health concerns, grief support, and creating an environment that is more openly supportive of mental health struggles. The survey also revealed a strong interest in specific activities and educational offerings. The top responses included support groups (64%), speakers on mental health topics (62%), intentional friendship gatherings (56%), and nature immersion

experiences (33%). Several participants wrote about their own journeys—through cancer, grief, caregiving, or recovery—and lifted up how meaningful it is simply to be heard and to know that others understand.

Perhaps most encouraging of all, many respondents said they would be willing to get involved personally: leading or participating in support groups or activity groups, helping organize events, mentoring others, or partnering with the WISE team. This tells us that while mental health challenges are real and sometimes overwhelming, the Spirit is also stirring up gifts of compassion, wisdom, and leadership within our congregation.

So what's next? Our WISE team is now working to draft a WISE Covenant, a statement that will outline our commitments as a congregation to be Welcoming, Inclusive, Supportive, and Engaged around mental health. In the coming months, we will share the draft covenant with the congregation through a series of adult education forums. These will be opportunities to learn, to ask questions, to share your own stories, and to shape the covenant together. Once we have done that work, the covenant will be brought before the congregation for a vote.

The survey confirmed what many of us already know: that mental health touches every one of our lives, and that church can be a place of healing, hope, and resilience. Thank you to everyone who took part. Together, we are taking steps toward becoming a truly WISE congregation.


"Stolen Pride"

In Stolen Pride: Loss, Shame, and the Rise of the Right, sociologist Arlie Hochschild seeks to understand how Americans have become so polarized in their politics. The book is based on research Hochschild did in Kentucky in the small towns which were hollowed out by the loss of coal jobs and an influx of OxyContin propelled by targeted marketing and availability.

Hochschild parallels economic loss with a losing economy of pride, a claim she develops with considerable nuance. Through time spent with several residents of Pikeville, Kentucky and surrounds over a three year period, she breaks down congealed



stereotypes of hillbillies and the area's deeply conservative and not so conservative institutional leaders as they express views on racism, neighborliness, white supremacy, Democratic Party, social justice issues, addiction, and the central value and measure of hard work.

The book covers ideas that have been aired by other sociologists intent on analyzing recent changes in U. S. society. <u>Caste</u> by Isabel Wilkerson separates the identification of social class from race. <u>Deaths of Despair</u> by Angus Deaton and Anne Case is a documentation of the health consequences of social class on middle aged white men – death from drug overdoses, suicide and alcohol liver disease – that figure prominently in small towns in Appalachia.

The U. S. Representative from Delaware, Sarah McBride, talking about our political divides, pointed to a loss of grace in our across-the-aisle conversations. By grace she means space to disagree or only partly agree with doctrinaire party positions. Her usage comes from her Presbyterian background.

Grace is what Hochschild gives to those with whom she talks. When she broaches the topic of a stolen election in 2020 with her subjects, she doesn't hesitate to point out "the steal" was not verified by any independent measure but accepts that "the steal" is a mythic narrative that means something other than objective truth to many of them.

Accepting the role a falsehood plays in our across-the-aisle conversations can be a stumbling block for many. Yet often we accept guiding stories, mythic Biblical stories without the same level of discomfort.

The library is not collecting books on Christian nationalism, but we did receive a donation of Andrew Whitehead's <u>American Idolatry: How Christian Nationalism Betrays the Gospel and Threatens the Church</u>. Reporter Tim Alberta's 2023 book, <u>The Kingdom, the Power, and the Glory: American Evangelicals in an Age of Extremism</u>, is worth reading by those interested in the details of the who and how of the movement.


